When workers cut corners on safety, they risk severe injuries from saw blades, falling objects, or flying debris.

Carpentry requires task-specific PPE to prevent accidents. This includes safety glasses or face shields to guard against wood chips, ear protection to reduce noise exposure, and cut-resistant gloves for handling sharp tools. Steel-toed boots protect feet from dropped materials, and hard hats shield from overhead hazards. Choosing and wearing the right PPE is not optional—it's the foundation of responsible, safe carpentry work.
