

Forklift Awareness: More Than Just a Big Fork Picture This

Always maintain clear travel paths, keep loads low, use horns at intersections, wear seatbelts, and enforce separation between forklifts and foot traffic. Forklift safety depends on awareness from everyone in the area—not just the driver.
