Lockout Tagout - Landscaping Stats and Facts



FACTS

Key hazards related to Lockout/Tagout (LOTO) procedures in the landscaping industry.

- 1. **Unexpected Startup of Equipment:** Failure to properly implement LOTO can result in the unexpected startup of machinery or equipment while it is being serviced or maintained.
- 2. **Inadequate Training:** Workers who are not adequately trained in LOTO procedures may not understand the importance of de-energizing equipment or may skip steps in the process.
- 3. Failure to Identify All Energy Sources: In complex equipment, multiple energy sources (electrical, hydraulic, pneumatic) may need to be controlled.
- 4. **Improper Use of Lockout Devices:** Using the wrong lockout devices or failing to secure them properly can result in ineffective isolation of hazardous energy, allowing the equipment to be re-energized accidentally□.
- 5. **Communication Failures:** Poor communication among workers can lead to confusion about whether equipment has been locked out. This can result in someone unknowingly re-energizing equipment while another worker is still performing maintenance□.
- 6. **Overconfidence and Complacency:** Workers who become complacent or overconfident in their familiarity with LOTO procedures may skip steps or fail to follow the process correctly.
- 7. **Inadequate Supervision: Hazard:** Lack of supervision or failure to enforce LOTO procedures can lead to non-compliance among workers, particularly in fast-paced environments like landscaping.

STATS

- According to (OSHA), failure to control hazardous energy (which LOTO is designed to prevent) accounts for nearly 10% of the serious accidents in many industries, leading to approximately 24,000 injuries and 120 fatalities annually in the U.S. (BLS.gov).
- While specific data for the landscaping industry isn't available, OSHA frequently lists LOTO violations among the top 10 most cited safety standards across all industries.
- In Canada, (CCOHS) emphasizes the critical importance of LOTO procedures. While exact numbers for the landscaping industry are not reported, non-compliance with LOTO procedures is recognized as a significant contributor to workplace injuries in industries that involve machinery (CCOHS).
- The LOTO standard is estimated to prevent 120 fatalities and 50,000 injuries

- each year across various industries, including landscaping.Workers exposed to hazardous energy lose an average of 24 workdays for recuperation due to injuries related to improper lockout/tagout practices.
