September's SafeSupervisor Newsletter focuses on a question every safety leader should be asking: **How do we know our workers can actually perform safely, not simply complete their training?**



This month's edition looks at the gap between training completion and demonstrated competence, including five stronger measures of training effectiveness: realistic decision-making, confidence versus performance, knowledge retention, field verification, and operational leading indicators.

We also examine a preventable heat-stress fatality that shows what can happen when workers and supervisors aren't trained to recognize escalating warning signs. With high temperatures still possible in September, heat awareness, acclimatization, hydration, emergency response, and supervisor intervention remain critical.

Other practical topics this month include working alone, visual fatigue and poor lighting, electrical safety and lockout/tagout, and safe hand-tool use.

Finally, we explore how AI-powered video translation is making multilingual safety training faster and more scalable, while reinforcing an important caution: translation must still be reviewed for technical accuracy and worker understanding.

Key takeaways for OHS leaders

- Completion records prove participation, not competence.
- High-risk work should include practical or field verification wherever possible.
- Heat illness warning signs need to be understood by workers and supervisors before an emergency occurs.
- Lone-worker systems only protect people when check-ins, communication and escalation procedures are consistently followed.
- Lighting, glare and visual fatigue deserve attention as workplace safety issues.
- Electrical work demands disciplined energy isolation, verification and appropriate PPE.
- Familiar tools can create serious injuries when inspection, PPE and basic safe-use practices become routine shortcuts.
- AI translation can improve access to training, but human linguistic and technical review remains essential.
- The strongest safety programs connect training data with observations, near misses, interventions and other operational indicators.
